

You must inventory your items for sale on the forms available on the guild website (mentioned above).

## Dec 2011 Spinning Workshop

Sarah Anderson is coming up from Washington State to teach 3 days of classes: Friday, Dec 2 – Sunday, Dec 4, 2011. Please mark the dates on your calendar and keep them open.

Sarah has been teaching at SOAR and Madrona. She has been spinning for 34 years. I have taken classes from her and she is a wonderful instructor. Sarah has a rare gift to simplify processes. She has a great U-tube video explaining Navaho (or chain) plying. Her approach is more ergonomic and manages yarn well, making N-ply simple. She had an article in Spin-Off where she used a spindle to hold the core yarn, to reduce the excess twist that can build up in core spun yarns. Her yarns and sweaters have an elegant style. They will inspire you.

We will set the actual classes in the spring. Sarah is willing to teach classes fine tuned to our needs. Examples of her previous classes are:

- Basic yarn construction and plying – what makes a good yarn?
- Fiber preparation from fleece to yarn – options in preparation
- Variations in drafting techniques – what difference does it make?
- Designer yarns – more advanced techniques
- Fiber & color blending – making the most of your carder
- Creating a personal 'Yarn Library'
- Spinning silk in its many forms

## Margaret Stove Spinning DVD

I got the new Margaret Stove spinning DVD:

Spin from the tip of your fiber; if you spin from the cut end you will get pills. Always remove the tips before spinning. If you spin from roving, always spin from the fold for no pills. If the yarn breaks while spinning let the wheel slow down on its own because if you stop the wheel you bury the end in the yarn. (Well who knew?)

If using a double drive and want fine spinning put on crochet thread of 30 that is the size of sewing thread you want no pull on the wheel





<http://www.ravelry.com>. I have mentioned this one before. It started as a knitting site, but has bloomed to include spinning and weaving. It has forums, where you can have conversations on many topics, from spindle spinning, spinning with dog hair, rigid heddle weaving to your favorite TV show. If you can imagine a topic it is probably already there. There is a "My Notebook" section where you can document your fiber stash (rovings, yarn, needles, books) and complete projects. This is a great database to document your supplies, raw materials and keep those notes on completed (and in progress) projects. There are other tabs for "patterns" and "yarn". If you have a yarn in your stash, you can look it up to see what projects other people used it for. You can also describe your yarn, such a wool & silk fingering weight that you might have handspun to get pattern ideas for it too. Then you can limit the patterns with criteria also, like free and/or hats, mittens, gloves, colorwork. In short this site is both a powerful database and a socially fun area to meet other like minded fiber people. You do have to sign up to get an account to log in. Trust me, it is worth it.
